JK & SK - Mrs. Kaemingh

A newly revised orange November calendar, newsletter and reading record went home for this new month. If you did not receive it today, please let me know and I can send home another. Thanks.

Grade 1 – Mrs. Bolt

Language Arts: Students have learned the reading strategy 'eagle eye' and how pictures can help us understand the words. We've also been working on putting finger spaces in our writing.

Please return October's reading log. November's will be coming home today.

Math: Students have been looking at which number comes before and after a number.

Science: There are tools that help make jobs easier and the students had fun looking at different ones.

Bible: Now we are reading and discussing Jacob's life; the birthright and his dream.

Next week's spelling words will be: top, stop, men, fix, and fox.

Memory Work: Hebrews 3:4 "For every house is built by someone, but the builder of all things is God."

Music: Students sang and participated in action songs this week. They also listened to the music of Bach.

Grade 2 Math: This week we worked on reading and making pictographs. Students enjoyed this. Next week we are counting/number sense to 100.

This week in language we worked on text to world connections as well as new vocabulary comprehension strategies. We completed word work and worked writing multiple sentences and editing skills. We also practiced writing and using contractions.

I haven't made a new monthly spelling sheet for students. I will put them on spelling city ASAP.

Grade 3 words for next week are: almost, before, myself, probably, thought, shirt, and skirt.

Grade 2 words are: could, didn't, or, small, going, and doing.

Memory work is the same as it's a bit tricky for us. 1 Peter 2:9 "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of Him who called out of darkness into his wonderful light."

In Bible we began our unit on Jacob and Joseph. This week we learned about Jacob taking Esau's birthright and blessing.

Mrs. Himanen:

This week we learned more about trees through studying leaf characteristics such as shape, margin, and vein pattern. Our adopted tree, Mable, has lost all of its leaves!

In gym the grade threes learned how to throw a football. We also played some new games involving physical activity and math that were learned at the convention.

In art we learned how to use watercolour paper to "paint" the background for our seahorse art. Both grades continue to work on their penmanship skills, and the grade threes are doing great at learning how to write in cursive!

Work folders come home today with new Word Wall Words (including Tic Tac Toe homework) and Memory Work (due Nov.13).

Highlights this week:

Bible: We covered a lot of ground this week! Jacob was reconciled with Esau. Rachel died after giving birth to Benjamin. Isaac died after Jacob's return. Jacob's sons sold Joseph into slavery, which ultimately lead to God working out His plan of his promise to make a great nation of Jacob's family. Joseph was able to help his family during the years of famine and God promised Jacob that one day his family would return to Canaan. Jacob blessed his sons before he died, indicating the 12 future tribes of Israel. Jacob requested to be buried in Canaan; Joseph also requested to be brought back to Canaan after he died. (Genesis 33-48). We will be reviewing our unit on Monday and Tuesday and completing a test on Wednesday.

Social Studies: Several students presented province/territory projects. We learned about the Interior Plains and did a scavenger hunt to find answers to questions.

Math Grade 3: We have been busy reviewing regrouping of two digit and three digit addition questions. We have been learning to remind ourselves that while sometimes work requires some effort, it doesn't mean we give up!

Grammar: Gr. 4 We continued to work with quotations using question marks and exclamation marks.

Gr. 3 We joined smaller sentences together to make better sentences. We have been learning about making subjects and verbs agree in a sentence as well.

We learned about commas in grammar and will continue our study next week with a quiz the following Monday or Tuesday.

In math the grade fives have been working on reviewing addition and subtraction with regrouping. Next, we will work on multiplication. Time to brush up on those x tables!

Mr. Himanen:

Science: Next week the class will be having a test on their light unit.

The students will need to remember how light travels and what happens to it when it hits different surfaces like mirrors and lenses. We will be reviewing the material prior to the test.

Social Studies: Early next week we will be having our election for the best possible pet. The groups have made their presentations to the different classrooms and we will see which group achieved the most votes.

Math 6: Next week on Wednesday, November 6, the class will be having a test on Multiplication. The students will need to review the steps for multiplying two digit numbers and powers of ten.

Music: Students learned to play A minor chord this week. They also practiced a new strumming stroke.

Mrs. Voortman:

Grade 8 Math: We learned how to solve inequalities and graph them. Even though our algebra unit is complete, we will continue to review it throughout the year.

Language Arts: We completed our short story unit this week with a test. We spent a great deal of time learning how to study for a test by collectively going through our notes and makes cue cards to help us. This is a very imperative skill and students quickly realized that they did much better when they studied this way. I was pleased to see so many students use what they learned and make their own cue cards for their recent science test.

Geography: We will start a short refresher unit on the geography of Canada next week.

History: Next week the class will be having a test on the material up to the beginning of the War of 1812. Science: The class will be starting their next science unit on Forces at Work next week. In this unit we will look at the different forces at work in our world every day as well as looking at the simple machines that we use every day.

Math 7: Next week the class will be learning about different polygons, congruent figures, and lines of symmetry. We are getting close to the end of this unit so there will be a test the following week.
